RECENT EVENTS

The debut of more than 30 exhibitions that comprise the Getty Museum's Pacific Standard Time initiative serves as an occasion to appreciate the long-standing central role that artists affiliated with UC Irvine's Department of Studio Art have played in the artistic landscape of Southern California for the last 40 years. In September, the Los Angeles Times published a list of the 20 artists whose work is featured in the greatest number of shows in this meta-exhibition. Of these, six almost one-third - of Southern California's most recognized artists are past or present faculty or alumni of our Studio Art programs. In total, 32 such affiliated artists (featured in 23 show venues) participated in PST.

and in conjunction with the Fourth International Conference on Contemporary Art 2011, Myers developed a piece that questioned the validity of the Conference theme, "Forms of collecting/ Forme della committenza."

Three faculty members of CTSA's Department of Music have been chosen to present papers at The 19th Congress of the International Musicological Society next July to be held at Rome's Auditorium Parco della Musica on the topic "Musics, Cultures, Identities." Presenters include Associate Professor Amy Bauer's "The Cosmopolitan Imagination in Ligeti's Weöres Songs;" Department Chair and Professor David Brodbeck's "'Come Out of the Ghetto!' The Goldmark-Bild of Ludwig Speidel;"

and Professor Margaret Murata's "Colloquy and

Desolation in Italian Spiritual Monody."

Drama Associate Professor Vincent Olivieri is continuing work on High, a new play starring Kathleen Turner, for which he wrote the music and created the sound design. It ran on Broadway last spring and began a national tour in December.

Dance Associate Professor Jennifer Fisher presented a paper in November at the joint meeting of the Congress on Research and Dance and the Society of Ethnomusicology in Philadelphia on the aesthetics of competition dance and its influence on concert dance.

Music Professors Michael Dessen and Nicole Mitchell and Dance Professor John Crawford worked with faculty from UC San Diego and New York University to create "Inspiraling 2012," a concert of new music and integrated video conceived for the telematic medium. Live music, featuring internationally renowned improvisers, was combined with a real-time improvised video response to create a trans-continental multimedia ensemble linking San Diego and New York City over Internet 2, a high speed research computer network. The San Diego Reader called the concert "a huge success on multiple levels." (pic)

Drama Chair and Professor Eli Simon was an invited guest at the National Theatre of Romania's International Theatre Festival, celebrating Romanian poet Gellu Naum. While there, Simon cast 21 actors from the National Theatre Company in his June production of War of the Clowns, which will open at the National Theatre.

Studio Art Professor Simon Leung presented a lecture for the Carnegie Mellon University School of Art in October, and wrote and performed "As If... an Opera" for the Les Figues Press benefit at Human Resources in Los Angeles in November.
